

Our students attended The Little Mermaid at The New Vic Theatre. This performance featured a variety of performing arts disciplines, including dance, drama, singing, live music, and aerial skills. It was amazing to see how a play was structured in a theatre in the round, with the mermaid emerging from the stage floor and characters swimming out of the ceiling.

Our Arts Award students will now complete a live theatre review before attending a variety of sessions to deepen their understanding of their selected discipline. Students will then take a leadership role in teaching a workshop to a selection of Year 4 students on their new performing arts skills.

A reminder about EScooters



With Christmas just around the corner, the Staffordshire Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP) has some important advice for anyone thinking about buying an e-scooter as a present.

While it's legal to buy and own an e-scooter, you can only legally ride a privately owned one on private land, with the landowner's permission.

This means it is against the law to ride, or to allow your child to ride, an e-scooter anywhere on the roads, pavements, cycle tracks and parks, or to school. If a child is stopped by the Police, and they suspect a parent or carer has purchased the e-scooter for them and allowed its use on the highway, the parent may be investigated for causing or permitting a traffic offence.

Riding an e-scooter illegally can result in a £300 fine, penalty points, and in some cases prosecution. It is also likely that the e-scooter will be seized.

As well as the legal implications of using e-scooters, they also pose a significant fire safety risk due to the lithium-ion batteries that are used to power them. These can spread a fire rapidly if they ignite and explode.

A polite reminder regarding uniform.....

Many thanks for your continued support in ensuring students wear the correct uniform. All students must return in January and adhere to the uniform policy, which is available in full here.

False nails, false lashes, and any new piercings must be removed before the first day back, Tuesday, 6th January. Students may wear a V-neck jumper made of wool-type material. Students are not permitted to wear crew neck jumpers/sweatshirts, and logos or motifs are not permitted on knitwear.

Students are allowed subtle makeup only. This is decided at the academy's discretion, but if students are wearing heavy, visible makeup, they will be asked to remove it.

Any student arriving at the academy wearing incorrect uniform can expect to be sent to our Inclusion hub to be isolated until the parent/carer can bring a replacement. The decision regarding the appropriateness of appearance is at the discretion of the OSSMA Pastoral Team.



We are seeing an increasing number of lost property items at the academy, particularly coats during the winter season.

Please ensure that students' coats and other belongings are labelled with their full names or initials and their form, to help us return items to students. We endeavour to locate lost items, but if they are not labelled, this can make it more difficult.

All lost property items are initially located at reception and are then stored in the uniform room for collection.

Real Life Crime and Punishment.....

We are delighted to share news of a truly memorable day for our Year 10 History students, who recently visited the National Justice Museum in Nottingham. The trip perfectly complemented their GCSE History module on Crime and Punishment, bringing many of the themes they have been studying in class to life.

Our 56 students spent the morning immersed in the realities of the Georgian and Victorian prison systems, exploring original cells and experiencing what it was like to be a prisoner through live actors. They examined authentic artefacts, including a pillory and a scold's

bridle, and visited three different exhibitions. Throughout, the museum staff questioned the students about what they were seeing – and our students impressed everyone with their thoughtful, well-informed answers.

The afternoon session took place in a historic courtroom, where students re-created the trial of Derek Bentley. Taking on roles including judge, jury, prosecution, defence and witnesses, students developed their own legal arguments and demonstrated outstanding reasoning and teamwork. After a lively debate, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

For context, the real Derek Bentley case had a very different outcome. Although he did not fire the fatal shot, Bentley was convicted of murder under the principle of joint enterprise and was executed in 1953.

After many years of campaigning, his conviction was finally quashed in 1998. The case remains a significant example of how the justice system and attitudes towards it have changed over time – making it a

truly valuable learning experience for our students.

We were exceptionally proud to hear museum staff praise our students' behaviour, manners, and contributions, describing them as the best they had ever seen from a school group.
